lives were **lost to suicide** in Kansas in 2022.

adults in Kansas have a mental health condition. That's more than **4x** the population of **Topeka**.

calls were made to Kansas's **988 Suicide & Crisis Line** call centers in 2023.

166,000

adults in Kansas reported needing mental health treatment but not receiving it between 2018-2019. **Cost is a prevailing factor** in not receiving treatment.
